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SOPHIELOU

Sophielou joined ACC in 2016 on the two year Music Performance course. She had the passion, drive and talent to succeed but felt she needed to polish her songwriting. She worked extremely hard to develop her songs but did not expect to also leave the course a more polished performer.

"Before starting the course I was someone who could write and sing. Upon leaving the course, I was a professional musician."

Dr Paul Francis, HE Course Director, worked with Sophielou on the course. "Sophielou really impressed me when we first met, she had a fantastic rawness about her songs but you could see, and she also knew, that she needed to refine them to become the finished product. We worked on her performance as well, also releasing a number of music videos to improve her confidence and now she's a mature artist."

Since completing the course, Sophielou has released numerous EPs. Her first, Out With The Old, reached number 7 in the iTunes R'n'B charts. Sophielou's music has reached different cities around the world and led to a huge amount of gigs, two of which saw her supporting UK artists Dappy and Akala. Sophielou is currently working on her debut album with live musicians that she met on the course.

JOSS FRANCIS

Joss Francis studied Music Production as a drummer with limited production experience, but was eager to pursue a career as a recording engineer. With the support of his tutors and an unwavering dedication to honing his craft throughout his time on the course, Joss challenged himself to develop his skillset, which has enabled him to forge a path for himself in the creative industries in a number of recording and production roles.

"The music production course was a gateway into the music industry for me. Before I started I had no knowledge of mixing, mastering or music production but the course gave me a strong foundation of knowledge in all of these areas to begin a career. Now I'm head sound tech for a Jazz bar in Nottingham and have worked privately with bands 1 to 1, as well as an award-winning London-based producer and engineer. Without this course and the tutors I wouldn't be where I am today!"



DYLAN BARBER

Dylan's passion for the production industry and the music industry began when he was seven his dad bought him a two channel interface. From there, he taught himself the basics of recording and mixing a song in their home living room.

"Access is a great place to study everybody in the building is like-minded and really wants to work hard to be a member of the creative industry access has got excellent access to industry standard facilities all of the tutors around us are really knowledgeable and it's a really sort of supportive and a great place to be to be doing a degree."

With some experience as a live sound engineer, Dylan wanted to turn his focus towards studio engineering and production, which is when he decided that the degree course was exactly what he needed to develop the skills required to meet his career goals.

Our tutors spent one-to-one time with Dylan, looking at how to approach the recording and production process from demo creation to completed masters, providing tailored feedback throughout, ensuring Dylan had an industry facing portfolio of work that would serve him beyond his time on the course.

One of Dylan's highlights from his time on the course was during an industry week talk with studio engineer Andrew Scheps (Adele, Beyonce, Metallica), hosted by the university, where Scheps offered feedback on one of Dylan's mixes. Scheps' positive feedback gave Dylan the confidence to pursue a career as a freelance studio engineer and producer.

Since completing the course, Dylan has gone on to open his own recording studio in Norwich under the name Fine City Recording Studio, win the Production Futures Breakthrough Award for Standout Technical Talent, record and mix projects for NPR's Tiny Desk, as well as work on projects and shows locally and nationally of various kinds including festivals, conferences, location recording work in unusual spaces, broadcast work and more.

MUSIC PRODUCTION FdA

Level of Study: Foundation degree

UCAS Code: J944 Start Date: September Duration: Two years, full-time Study Mode: Full-time

Learning in world-class studios, packed full of industry-standard kit, you'll explore music creation from a technical and creative standpoint and discover and nurture your own creative path.

You'll learn practical music theory and apply it to your own compositions, whether that's individually or collaboratively in your work in employable fields such as media composition or songwriting.



You'll understand and work within commercial parameters to ensure you graduate with the best chance of working within the industry, but you'll be encouraged to explore the more experimental aspects of recording, production and composition to truly find your own identity.

You'll have plenty of opportunities to put your learning into practice, through live projects, masterclasses and guest lectures. You'll also benefit from being assigned an industry mentor in your final year.

What you'll study

The course curriculum balances theoretical study alongside practical application. Throughout the course you'll be challenged to develop your decision-making in new, and at times, complex and unpredictable contexts. The content of the course also closely reflects current working practices in industry, and aims to prepare you for work in a highly competitive workplace. Students in audio and music technology will increasingly be faced with freelance and self-employed models of work upon graduation.

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YEAR 1 MODULES

Introduction to the Studio 20 credits

You will begin your journey into the studio environment by developing your understanding of the fundamentals of recording. You will learn about large format consoles, signal flow, connections, microphone types, and DAWs to record audio.

You'll be able to apply these skills whether you're in a traditional studio or have a small home set up: get this right now, and it will set you up for all of your future studio work.

Studio Practice 20 credits

In this module, you'll discover the magic of recording various artists using different styles of recording such as multitracking and overdubbing, in session and in your own time, to form a portfolio of studio work.

Pro Tools Techniques 20 credits

In the professional audio world Pro Tools is the DAW of choice. In this module, you'll learn how to use this powerful application by covering Pro Tools navigation and operation, setting you up for the rest of your course and career in audio, and paves the way for Pro Tools accreditation.

● Creative Music Technology 20 credits

In this module, you will explore the creative potential of various music technologies. You will exercise your creativity through music production, and learn a variety of techniques and technologies, such as sampling, synthesis, improvisation and composition in the DAW, hardware controllers, sound design, and remixing.

You will also gain a deeper contextual understanding of electronic music, through a global and ethical lens.

Music Composition and Theory 20 credits

Composing music is like painting on a blank canvas, and depending on the genre there are certain rules to be aware of. This module will provide you with the guidelines that will form the foundation for your music to be functional with these forms, as well as allowing you to build in your own creativity and originality.

This module will teach you the fundamentals of music theory such as harmony, melody, accompaniment and arranging, enabling you to communicate emotions and feelings through your compositions. You'll demonstrate your understanding though portfolio tasks and explore a genre of interest and compose a representative piece as well as research the genres context in a short negotiated practical research submission.

YEAR 2 MODULES

Studio Production 20 credits

You will explore digital, analogue, and hybrid studio technologies, developing recording and processing techniques to take on a variety of productions over the module: this could be using traditional studio environments (on-site or external) or your own DIY production set ups.

You will collaborate with performers, artists, and other students to work on a wide base of genres, selecting a range of your productions for a portfolio that should be approaching commercial standards.

Mixing 20 credits

In this module, you'll work to client supplied briefs as well as your own self sourced material, engaging in technical and creative post production and mixing processes to create a portfolio of work. You'll critically compare your mixes with industry outputs from around the world and learn approaches to help you meet commercial benchmarks.

You'll cover techniques with compression, effects and automation with additional production skills such as vocal editing and production, drum production and other genre specific approaches of additional production through a range of projects.

Contextual Studies in Music Production 20 credits
The history of music technology has informed where we are and where
we might go next. In this module, you will be exposed to decades of key
recordings, technologies, events, artists and the movers and shakers
involved in shaping modern popular music as we know it.

You will choose your own specific area of interest in music technology and production and explore how it's impacted creativity and the development of the wider world of music within an essay, accompanied by practical assets to illustrate your understanding.

Music Composition Portfolio 20 credits

In this module, you will learn how to compose music for a wide range of purposes, including songwriting and music for media with both solo and collaborative approaches.

You will develop an understanding of the wider global, historical and ethical contexts whilst building on your existing technical and artistic skills. You will continue to develop your ability to express yourself artistically, while also understanding the needs of a demanding and everchanging industry.



MUSIC PERFORMANCE FdA

Level of Study: Foundation degree

UCAS Code: W313 Start Date: September Duration: Two years, full-time Study Mode: Full-time

Study our foundation degree in Music Performance and you'll be equipped with a broad set of practical skills, while being given the opportunity to focus on your personal development as a professional musician. At key points during the course you'll also have direct access to Confetti's sister company - record label, Denizen - for advice and guidance.



- This course is designed to meet the demands of industry.
- Engage with a variety of composition, arrangement and performance projects, working individually and collaboratively, directly mimicking working practices in the industry. Explore new creative avenues when learning how to compose music for visual media, while continuing to develop as a songwriter and performer.
- Core areas of study include; stage craft, music theory, composition and arrangement techniques, audio and MIDI sequencing, studio sound recording, editing, composing and performing with technology, musicology and event management.
- Have access to Confetti's annual Industry Week previous guests include Professor Green and Casetteboy.
- Undertake an industry-focused module in each year of the course.
- Benefit from bespoke guest lectures and workshops delivered by visiting industry professionals.

What you'll study

Our Music Performance degree is tailored to your musical goals allowing you to develop technical mastery of your first instrument whilst also broadening your understanding of other subject areas and ways of thinking about songwriting, composition, performance and music management.

YEAR 1 MODULES

Composition & Arrangement 40 credits

Here you will develop your understanding of composition and music arrangement. You'll be given grounding in music theory, arrangement techniques and composition, while developing hands-on skills in music production software. During this module you'll study different approaches to composing. You'll work individually and collaboratively on projects as you develop your understanding of composing for a range of genres, creating a body of work that demonstrates your developing practice.

Performance Techniques 40 credits

This module aims to develop your performance techniques, focusing on several key areas. You'll develop technical competence in playing an instrument through studying contemporary performance techniques, developing skills in sight reading, listening and improvisation. You'll develop your skills as a performer in solo and group contexts, considering the communicative nature of musical performance, your relationship with the audience and exploring the performance environment.

Recording Studio Practice 20 credits

New technologies are enabling more musicians to record their own music and self-produce. However, the ability of musicians to effectively communicate thoughts and ideas about their work with sound engineers and producers is still an invaluable asset. You'll develop your understanding of sound recording practices to aid you in your future career as a professional musician. You'll also study the historical development of recording technology and its impact on musical styles, as well as the wider influence on society and culture.

The Music Industry 20 credits

You'll develop knowledge and understanding of how changes in the industry impact consumer trends and working practices. This module focuses heavily on your development as an emerging professional, so there is a strong emphasis on completing work for clients as part of your study. You'll also be introduced to the pressures of working for clients through the completion of a live client brief. The aim is for you to acquire practical experience of the skills and attributes needed for employment in the industry.

YEAR 2 MODULES

Applied Contemporary Musicians 60 credits

You'll develop your performance techniques and enhance your technical skills, while broadening your contextual understanding of musical performance. You'll continue to develop technical mastery on your first instrument – performing individually and collaboratively to develop your stagecraft and hone your skills as a performer. As well as a focus on traditional musicianship, you'll also explore the integration of different technologies in performance. You'll research the historical and contemporary use of technology in performance and use this research to inform the integration of technology in your own work.

Omposing Music for Visual Media 20 credits

A composer for visual media must be able to work collaboratively, taking direction from others to develop their work. It is also important to understand the emotive impact music can have and how to write music that enhances the viewing experience. You'll explore the application of compositional tools for specific themes, such as horror, romance, drama, sadness, suspense and comedy. There is a strong emphasis on critical thinking and reflection through the study of a wide range of commercial compositional work and analysis of your own work.

Contextual Studies in Music 20 credits

Music plays an integral part in everyday life across a diverse range of cultures and societies. In many ways, music provides the touchstones of human experience. Music can transcend language and cultural barriers. It can have an effect on individual and social identity, politics, fashion and technology. This module encourages you to examine the historical significance of music and its impact on global cultures and societies. You will also study the fundamental aspects of the psychology of music and its effect on the human brain in terms of emotive response to music and sound.

Industry Practice 20 credits

You'll undertake appropriate self-directed projects, working collaboratively on creative work, allowing you to directly apply the knowledge and skills learnt throughout the programme in the context of the workplace. This module aims to develop your overall professionalism and provide you with the knowledge and resources required to begin your career in the creative industries.

STUDENT SUPPORT

Fees

Tuition fees are £9,250 per year.

A non means-tested, tuition fee loan may be available and is linked to the cost of your course. You can apply to borrow some of, or all of, the cost of your tuition fees. If you apply and are granted a loan, this will be paid directly to your Higher Education institute by Student Finance England.

You don't start repaying this loan until you have graduated and are earning over £25,000. Payments come directly out of your salary, so you don't have to worry about it.

Entry requirements

- You must be at least 18 years of age on 31st Dec on the year of entry.
- You will be required to achieve a recognised Level 3 qualification (e.g. RSL, BTEC, A Levels) which generates a minimum of 64 UCAS points (2017 tariff) in a music related subject, or where music is a key component.
- All candidates must have achieved A* C in GCSE Maths and English.
- You will be required to provide evidence of your prior qualifications (achieved or predicted).
- Mature candidates (21+ years of age) with non-standard qualifications and/or substantial experience in the music or related industries, are encouraged to apply and will be considered if they demonstrate appropriate ability through interview.
- Students who do not have English as a first language are required
 to achieve the equivalence of a minimum of 6.0 overall with no band
 below 5.5 from a Secured English Language Test (SELT), the most
 common being IELTS, PTE or CAE. A student may be advised to
 undertake additional language courses or receive language support
 toward achieving the required standard by the start of the course,
 during the first term or by the end of the first year.
- Applicants without the full entry requirements may be considered for non-standard entry.
